On Scout Sunday each year, we are reminded of how many people in our community are involved in our Scouts program and of the wide reach and deep impact of our Scouts in this community and beyond. AN EXCITING MISSION OPPORTUNITY

In this year when we give thanks to God for the ways our church has been used in the past, we have an opportunity to continue and extend our relationship with the Vietnamese Baptist Church, located not too far away from our church on Poinsett Highway. That church is looking for English speaking people who can assist them with Sunday School. Specifically, they want someone who can teach their elementary and middle school aged students. The persons involved do not have to speak Vietnamese.

As is so often the case with language congregations, the second and third-generation folks often do not know the language of their parents/grandparents, which presents a challenge to the church leadership.

Specifically, the church will need two workers. It does not need to be the same two volunteers every week, so there can be a rotation set up. The time frame is not indefinite, but the volunteers will need to understand it will not be a short stint either. The Vietnamese want to have some of their people work with the English speakers and learn from them so they can take responsibility for the classes in the future. The Sunday School at the Vietnamese Baptist Church begins at 9:30 each Sunday morning.

CHURCH CONFERENCE UPDATES

Our January church conference was held on Wednesday, January 26. Information was shared from several church entities and several items of business were presented and approved by the congregation. Below is a summary of the reports and items of business.

From the Financial Oversight Council

Russell Young, our church treasurer, presented the year-end financials for 2021. Russell noted that while our offerings were behind our budget for almost the entire calendar year, we met and exceeded our budget goal, thanks to gifts given in the last two weeks of 2021. Russell also noted that our church was able to renovate the Sanctuary at a cost of \$655,000 without incurring any debt, external or internal. From the Centennial Celebration Committee

Denise Plumblee provided the congregation with information on the upcoming events planned for the centennial celebration. A document containing information about these events was distributed and is enclosed in this newsletter.

From the Personnel Committee

Margo Love gave the report on behalf of the Personnel Committee. There were two motions presented and unanimously approved. The first provides a one-time 10% bonus to all ESBC staff members in appreciation for their continued leadership and wisdom during these unsettling times. The second revises the title and job description for the open position from "Associate Pastor" to "Connections Pastor". The revised job description can be found in this newsletter. The committee is now forming a search committee. Please continue to pray that God will make his plan clear and will be working in the heart of the person he is choosing for our church.

From the Nominating Committee

Stephen Clyborne explained to the congregation about the recent restructuring within the Missions Cluster. There is an article to the right about this restructuring. Following Stephen's presentation, Knox Boggs, vice-chair of the Nominating Committee, presented a list of leaders to fill the positions within the Missions Cluster. Knox made a recommendation that the church approve the list and the recommendation was approved. A page outlining the new Missions Cluster structure and the leaders enlisted to serve is enclosed in this newsletter.

A NEW WAY TO SUPPORT LOCAL, STATE, NATIONAL, AND INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS

Background

For years, entity leaders on the Missions Cluster (including the leaders of the Woman's Missionary Union, now dissolved) have been engaged in an ongoing discussion about the possibility of consolidating, streamlining, and re-imagining the way our church supports local, state, national, and international missions, both in terms of mission funding and mission action. After many meetings involving Staff Ministers, Deacons, and the Missions Cluster, a new plan and organizational structure for missions support was recently approved by the Deacons.

Organization

- 1. The structure of the Missions Cluster will be simplified and reorganized around three mission councils, each of which will include a chair and vice-chair nominated by the Nominating Committee and approved by the church, a deacon assigned to the Missions Cluster, and a liaison from each mission focus supported by the church:
 - a. Local Missions Council
 - b. National Missions Council (including state missions)
 - c. International Missions Council
- 2. All current mission teams will be dissolved as separate and official entities, but will be represented by liaisons on the respective mission councils.

Funding

- 1. All mission line items that are currently budgeted will remain as budgeted line items in the next budget year (2023).
- 2. The Missions Cluster will set the goals for International and National Missions offerings (Annie Armstrong, Lottie Moon, Janie Chapman, and Global Hunger relief, etc.) to present to the congregation.
- 3. Beginning in 2023, the Missions Cluster will plan a unified, church-wide missions emphasis sometime in the March May time frame to support a Worldwide (local, state, national, and international) Missions Offering and/or pledge period.

March 12 - Wildfire - Roaring '20s: It's A Birthday Celebration Event!

March 13 - Centennial Sunday: Celebrating 100 Years of ESBC

On Sunday, March 13, we will have a special Sunday of worship and celebration. In our worship service at 10:30 am, we will be re-living and re-creating the first worship service of the newly constituted Earle Street Baptist Church. Stephen will be bringing a message using the same biblical text used by Dr. W.T. Derieux in March of 1922 under the tent. Before and after the service, there will be historical exhibits around the church and our building will be open for tours. Immediately following the worship service, we will gather on the front steps of the Sanctuary for a panoramic centennial photograph.

April 3 - Celebration Sunday: Janice Hinnant's 27th Anniversary

Sunday, April 3, 2022 is the twenty-seventh anniversary of Rev. Janice Hinnant, our minister of music. In 2020, a celebration was planned that had to be postponed due to the pandemic. Now, two years later, we will finally celebrate the anniversary of our minister of music who has led our music for more than a quarter of a century. Join us at 10:30 am for our worship service where Janice's contributions to ESBC will be recognized. An anthem has been commissioned in her honor, which the combined Youth and Sanctuary Choirs will be performing. All of our choirs will be presenting special music.

Joint Worship Service with Northgate Baptist Church

Our celebration continues on April 3 as we gather with one of our daughter churches, Northgate Baptist, for a joint worship service at 5:00 pm. Barry Jimmerson, the pastor of Northgate, will be preaching as their congregation joins us at ESBC. There will be a joint choir and testimonies from ESBC members who have connections to all three generations of our church: Central (our mother church), Earle Street, and Northgate (our daughter church) as well. Following the joint service, we will enjoy fellowship together in our Fellowship Hall.

April 24 - 100th Birthday Party Celebration A Family-Friendly Event

Join us as we celebrate our centennial year in a family-friendly way with a 100th birthday party on this Sunday afternoon in April at 2:00 pm. We will celebrate with cupcakes, games, and lots of fun. All ages are encouraged to attend and eveyone is invited to dress like they are 100 years old.

June 5 – Pentecost Sunday Celebration: Joint Worship Service with Vietnamese Congregations

Pentecost Sunday is the perfect time to hear the gospel in more than one language! We will celebrate with two more of our daughter churches – the Greenville Vietnamese Church and the Vietnamese Blessing Baptist Church - on June 5 with joint fellowship at 9:30 am and worship at 10:30 am. We will sample the cuisine of each other's culture as the Vietnamese congregations provide refreshments along with refreshments provided by ESBC. The music for the service will be presented by the Vietnamese congregations. Tam Van Vo, who has been involved since the Vietnamese congregation began meeting at Earle Street in 1993, will give a greeting and brief review of how our church sponsored the Vietnamese congregation, and how the Vietnamese congregations have changed, relocated, and grown through the years. Stephen will be bringing a brief sermon for both congregations with the assistance of a translator.

Anniversary Celebration Weekend Saturday, August 20 - Celebration Dinner Sunday, August 21 - Celebration Sunday

We will complete our centennial celebrations with this special weekend in August. On Saturday, August 20, we will have a celebration dinner and program at 6:00 pm at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Greenville. Our new history book, *A Home to All Who Would Enter*, will be debuted that evening along with the official release of the Earle Street Baptist Church Centennial documentary video. This is a ticketed event. Tickets are limited and will go on sale on Sunday, March 13, 2022.

On Sunday, August 21, our year-long centennial celebration will culminate in worship in our Sanctuary. Dr. James G. Wooten, our former pastor for twenty-one years, will be bringing our message. There will be historial exhibits for viewing throughout our facilities and we will place a centennial time capsule, a legacy to be opened by the ESBC congregations of the future.

JOB DESCRIPTION

POSITION: Connections Pastor

REPORTS TO: Senior Pastor

HOURS: Full-time (benefits to be determined by Personnel Committee)

GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

The Connections Pastor is responsible for overseeing the connection and spiritual growth strategy of Earle Street Baptist Church under the direction and leadership of the Senior Pastor (or the Senior Pastor's designee). The Connections Pastor will seek to get and keep people connected to our church and to keep our church connected to our community. The Connections Pastor will work to facilitate the relational connection and spiritual growth of adults through various weekly services, small groups, volunteer teams, and assimilation of new members.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

Connecting People through First Impressions: Responsible for creating an environment that welcomes new guests and provides next steps towards connection and spiritual growth.

- Leading, equipping and empowering guest service volunteers in providing inviting first impressions
- Providing volunteer team with current guest services best practices
- Ensuring that our signage and facilities are focused on new people
- Creating and continuously improving follow-up methods to ensure that guests are plugged into ESBC

Connecting People through Assimilation: Responsible for helping new members find their unique purpose at ESBC and help them plug in to a ministry.

- Creating an environment and system that is conducive for plugging new people into ministry
- Working with ministry team leaders to recruit, train, and empower new members
- Providing centralized efforts for leadership training
- Building systems and structures that lead people from being spectators to volunteers and active participants

Connecting People through Small Groups: Responsible for developing a systematic and effective approach to connect people in small groups and moving them from visitors to members who embrace their growth potential.

- Oversee the information and tracking of small group participants and leaders
- Implement a strategy to identify, recruit, train and develop small group leaders
- Work with the Senior Pastor and other ministers to develop a content strategy for small groups
- Develop a tracking system to monitor small groups and to keep track of their growth and health

Connecting People through Outreach in the Community: Responsible for overseeing community relationship building activities in order to better connect the people of ESBC into the community and raise awareness of ESBC in the community.

- Coordinate with other pastoral leadership and lay leadership to cast the vision and develop the framework for mission partnerships in the community,
- Coordinate and develop relationships with the leadership of various and diverse entities in our community in order to discover their needs, opportunities, and challenges.

- Work with staff and lay leadership in designing and planning periodic events to allow the people of ESBC opportunities to connect with these mission partnerships.
- Review the various activities and events planned periodically to ensure they continue to match with the mission partnership strategy of the church.

Additional Responsibilities

- 1. Serve as staff liaison to the Spiritual Growth and Missions Clusters, coordinating the work of all the entities in those clusters, serving as a resource person to them, and participating actively in their work as time allows.
- 2. Work closely with the Nominating Committee in securing volunteer leadership for entities in the Spiritual Growth and Missions Clusters.
- 3. Plan and coordinate leadership training opportunities to assist leaders of adults in the Spiritual Growth and Missions Clusters and to develop new leaders in those areas.
- 4. Work with the Sunday School Council, Discipleship Leadership Team, and others to lead the planning, organizing, conducting, coordinating and evaluating of a comprehensive ministry of Christian education and spiritual growth for adults.
- 5. Assist the Senior Pastor in teaching, preaching, visitation and pastoral care as needed.
- 6. Coordinate with the Technology Committee and other staff as appropriate to develop and implement a social media strategy for the church.

General Responsibilities

- 1. Participate in the development and support of a staff covenant to build a strong ministry team.
- 2. Participate in continuing education opportunities in order to stay abreast of new technology and current trends that impact and affect their area of responsibility and ministry.
- 3. Be familiar with and follow all personnel and financial policies of the church.
- 4. Represent the church in the community with integrity, sensitivity, dignity, and morality.
- 5. Accept other responsibilities as assigned by the Senior Pastor.
- 6. Give adequate attention to personal health (physical, emotional, and spiritual) and family responsibilities.
- 7. In cooperation with the other ministerial staff, model and lead the church to live "the greater way" as outlined in "Our Greater Way Covenant."
